The Middle Tennessee Council (MTC) is the fastest growing Council of 270 Boy Scouts of America Councils Nationwide, with youth membership growing over 24% since 2015.



Scouting has a positive impact on 18,639 youth in the Middle Tennessee Council. The Scouting program teaches citizenship, leadership, physical fitness and enables young people to have the opportunity, at every turn to develop and reach their full potential.

2017 SCOUTING HIGHLIGHTS

- 7,365 Cub Scout and 2,208 Boy Scout rank advancements were earned.
- ⇒ 11,732 Merit Badges were earned by Boy Scouts in the Council.
- 383 Boy Scouts earned the rank of Eagle the highest rank in Scouting.
- ⇒ 10,572 Cub Scouts participated in overnight camp or day camp.
- 4,741 Participants attended Latimer Reservation programs.
- 4,052 Boy Scouts participated in week-long Summer Camp or BSA High Adventure Base.

⇒ 3.050 Grimes Canoe Base float days.

⇒ 695 Boy Scouts and Webelos participated in Winter Camp.

→ More than 64,700 hours of community service by Scouts and adults were logged in 2017, translating to more than \$1.4 million investment (at

The MTC, BSA strives to serve youth from all cultural and socioeconomic backgrounds. A major emphasis of Scoutreach is to keep inner-city, at-risk children engaged in programs that add value to their lives, by teaching them leadership, life and job skills. In 2017, 1,825 youth were part of Scoutreach, and the Council invested more than \$337,773 in this important initiative.

The Council's Specific Assistance program makes Scouting affordable to all current and potential members in the form of need-based financial assistance. In 2017, 1,495 youth and 221 adults received some type of financial assistance totaling \$125,100
