For 3O years, TPAC has demonstrated that, as Plutarch said, "The mind is not a vessel to be filled, but a fire to be kindled." In a million combustible moments, more than 1.5 million children have been served statewide through TPAC Education's curriculum-based programs. All ages flock here for the opportunity to experience great theatre, ballet, opera, touring Broadway blockbusters, comedians, musicians and every kind of performing artist you can think of – from internationally known celebrities to gifted local performers. TPAC's average annual state and local economic impact – something that makes the heart of a banker sing – tallies around \$40 million.

TPAC serves the statewide community by providing these live performances – with supporting curriculum – to children and educators in need of exciting ways to tie vital lessons to great works of art. In addition to \$900,000 in services to schools, we provide about \$30,000 in free and subsidized tickets for low income families and students served by nonprofit organizations. We are an active player in state and local networks that advocate for accessibility in the arts, a leader in serving children and adults with disabilities, and we have special expertise in serving those who are blind or deaf. We make a concerted effort to reach out to anyone who may be underserved by the arts – Fort Campbell families in the armed services community, rural communities, Latin American and African American communities, young adults, individuals with disabilities, and more.

TPAC strives for the highest quality of customer services to all our constituents – audiences, artists, educators, children, donors and others – through constantly growing our technologies to communicate and make attending TPAC as easy and convenient as possible; through retaining talented staff with a reputation for excellence in backstage operations and all aspects of facility management; through personal customer service to ticket-buyers, aided by a cross-department patron services team which meets monthly; and through constant survey and evaluation of all processes related to customer service, from ticketing to our communications with each constituency.

This has been a banner fiscal year, beginning with the 2011 Fest de Ville Gala at the War Memorial Auditorium that honored Tim McGraw and Ted Welch and included a performance from Kristin Chenoweth marked by creative lighting and scenic design – and on-stage surprises! Finally, nothing outshone the premiere of the Jerry Lewis musical, *The Nutty Professor*, with music by Marvin Hamlisch and direction from Mr. Lewis. What a thrill to have both legends in residence providing leadership for this world-class premiere.

My hope is that your imagination has been kindled by some of the shows TPAC brought to audiences this year. We're grateful for your commitment and your gifts to TPAC. I'll see you at the next show.

The arts are among the world's most powerful tools for teaching and learning, as we've experienced for 30 years. We have some new and exciting stories about daily work of art during our 2011-12 season that has expanded our curriculum-based reach into Tennessee classrooms.

In July, TPAC Education released its first CD: Give Yourself a High Five, a recording by Nashville musicians for pre-school children. Perfect for home or Head Start, the album gently teaches practical lessons as kids play, interact, exercise, and stretch their imaginations. Still on a roll more than a year after its release, the CD went on to earn glowing reviews and a prestigious Parents' Choice Gold Award.

In September, we announced that TPAC Education was chosen for the first pilot project of **Disney Musicals in Schools** outside of New York City. We watched in awe as children at five elementary schools produced their own musicals, guided by TPAC teaching artists and resources from Disney Theatrical Group and the Walt Disney Company. Student vocabulary grew. Self-confidence soared. Imagination ran wild with familiar Disney characters and legends of literature. Entire school communities – including parents – were energized and inspired by the collaboration it takes to produce a musical.

Two more TPAC Education programs for children – ArtSmart and Humanities Outreach in Tennessee – made an equally powerful impact.

Teaching artists collaborated with educators for 276 classroom residencies, serving 7,102 children and 306 teachers at no cost to them. We seated a total audience of 26,484 at TPAC for lively performances, giving each educator the tools to make curriculum connections and meet standards. More than 400 teachers took part in our specialized arts integration training.


We read studies, hear from teachers, and observe for ourselves. Arts education engages children in learning, crossing cultural, academic and socio-economic borders.

The experience of the live performance also builds bridges across cultures and generations. The same power and magic that transforms lives in the classroom is at work during every live performance at TPAC. Positive response to our Broadway series, special engagements, and new events at **War Memorial Auditorium** combined for thriving ticket sales. The generosity of our supporters set a record, with contributions to our annual campaign topping \$1 million for the first time in our history.

This has been a banner year for the Tennessee Performing Arts Center and you played a leading role in our success. Thank you.

## AC Education ROCKS!

The 2011-12 season began on a high note when TPAC Education released its first album, which went on to win a Parents' Choice Gold Award: Give Yourself a High Five is a treasure trove of small-sized songs, percussion dance breaks, and poems for pre-school play and learning. Professional Nashville musicians collaborated on 29 tracks, introducing children to a variety of American and international music traditions, while gently teaching practical skills and habits.

Album producer Lattie Brown manages the TPAC Education program, "Wolf Trap," for Head Start classrooms. TPAC Education is an affiliate of **Wolf Trap Early Learning Through the Arts**, the national institute known for its innovation teaching strategies for early childhood education through, music, movement, theatre, puppetry and storytelling. At the Metro Action Commission's annual summer training, TPAC Education donated 200 copies of the CD to Nashville Head Start teachers, who have loved using the recording with their children.

Brown and other musicians on the recording are specially trained teaching artists who were inspired by their work with pre-school children. They dedicated the CD to the "strong, creative, leading educators" in the Head Start Centers. TPAC Teaching Artists Rachel Sumner, Jocelyn Sprouse, Dann Sherrill, Ginger Sands, Kathleen Lynam, and Jamie London collaborated with Brown on the project.

## ISNEY Musicals in Schools

Another magical, musical experience for children was announced in September 2011, adding a fifth program to our educational offerings. TPAC Education and Metro Nashville were selected by Disney Theatrical Group to pilot **Disney Musicals in Schools**, an outreach initiative formerly available only to New York City public schools.

Like Disney, TPAC Education specially trains teaching artist faculty to work in partnership with educators in classrooms. The programs also share common goals: Meeting curriculum standards, strengthening school communities, and developing an appreciation for the musical as a collaborative art.

Disney KIDS musicals, created in partnership with Musical Theater International (MTI), are about 30 minutes in length, and have been adapted from the classic Disney films 101 Dalmatians, Aladdin, The Aristocats, Cinderella, The Jungle Book, Sleeping Beauty, and Winnie the Pooh.

Disney Musicals in Schools was launched in response to Disney Theatrical Group's (DTG) concern that low-income students in urban, public schools were not afforded equitable access to the arts. After two years of the program thriving in New York City Schools, DTG announced its plan to select a performing arts organization for the launch of Disney Musicals in Schools in a community outside of New York.

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## Mye NASHVILLE Schools Selected

The five Nashville schools selected for the first year of Disney Musicals in Schools were:

- /// Glengarry Elementary School
- /// Hattie Cotton STEM Magnet Elementary School (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics)
- /// Hull-Jackson Montessori Magnet School
- /// Kirkpatrick Elementary Enhanced Option School
- /// Percy Priest Elementary School

At no cost to them, the schools received a performance license to the Disney KIDS musical of their choice, comprehensive resource materials, and in-school support from TPAC teaching artists. At each school, 30 to 70 children from grades three through five took part, on and off the stage.

The students performed for the public at their schools and for each other at the "Student Share" event at TPAC. Based on the success of the pilot project, the program will continue in Nashville and expand to other cities nationwide.

## //ENGAGING Learners of All Ages

Combined, the programs of TPAC Education engaged 41,769 individuals over the 2011-12 season.

In addition to Wolf Trap Early Learning Through the Arts and Disney Musicals in Schools, two more programs serve children and educators in Nashville and Tennessee. TPAC has delivered curriculum arts education for three decades, from pre-school through high school, subsidizing student participation in annual curriculum-based activities. TPAC Education also offers an exciting and popular series for adults.

Humanities Outreach in Tennessee (HOT) presents an annual season of performances for young people to complement classroom learning objectives and support curriculum standards. The program provides teachers with free guidebooks, training, and other resources.

**ArtSmart** coordinates classroom study units and professional development opportunities to mine the rich educational opportunities in works of art. Teaching artists and educators collaborate on residencies serving students of all abilities and learning styles through learning activities and arts integration.

<u>InsideOut</u> offers programs for adults – lunchtime discussions, pre-show talks with artists and experts, workshops, opportunities to go behind the scenes, and other enrichment events. Each event in the series, including the Arts Appetizer on the Wednesday evening before each Broadway tour, almost always fill to standing room only.



## ///OT Season for YOUNG PEOPLE

TPAC Education's annual Season for Young People meets multiple curriculum standards, as history, literature, physical science, math and more come to life at TPAC, setting the stage for fun and powerful learning experiences. Free guidebooks are provided for teachers who bring students to performances at little or no cost to them. Fuel scholarships are available to schools outside of Davidson County.

During the 2011-12 school year **Humanities in Outreach in Tennessee (HOT)** presented:

- /// La Traviata, Nashville Opera, October 11, 2011: Giuseppe Verdi's glamorous portrait of an 18th century courtesan forced to give up her dreams of love;
- /// The Rivalry, L.A. Theatre Works, November 1-3, 2011: Norman Corwin's riveting depiction of the debates between Abraham Lincoln and Stephen Douglas;
- /// Alice in Wonderland, Théâtre Tout à Trac, November 9-17, 2011: an imaginative staging of Lewis Carroll's novel, filled with surprises, humor, and adventure and an homage to reading and discovery;
- /// San Jose Taiko, December 6-9, 2011; expressing the strength and harmony of the human spirit through the voice of taiko (Japanese for "large drum"), as it has for centuries;
- /// Treasured Stories by Eric Carle, Mermaid Theatre of Nova Scotia, February 28-March 2, 2012: transforming the stage into living pages from The Very Hungry Caterpillar; Brown Bear, Brown Bear; What Do You See?; and Papa, Please Get the Moon for Me.
- /// Diavolo Dance Theater, March 5-7, 2012: redefining dance through dynamic movements as Diavolo ("I fly through the day") astonishes students and teachers with dramatic leaping, flying, and twirling, creating metaphors for modern-day challenges;
- /// Fisk Jubilee Singers, March 28, 2012: a stirring performance of spirituals from the legendary singers under the direction of Professor Paul T. Kwami;
- /// Of Mice and Men, National Players, April 12-13, 2012: adapted from John Steinbeck's Nobel Prize-winning novel about migrant ranch workers in California during the Depression; and
- **Zorro**, Visible Fictions, May 8-11, 2012: featuring the mysterious, masked figure on his adventurous quest for justice.

ArtSmart Focus Works were Alice in Wonderland, San Jose Taiko, Treasured Stories by Eric Carle, and Diavolo Dance Theater, along with Exploration and Discovery, sculptures in Public Square Park.

## Ational Education GRANT

TPAC Education was one of ten organizations to receive a National Education Grant from The Broadway League, the trade association representing the industry in New York and nationwide.

The awards support innovative programs to provide young people with experiences in touring Broadway as a form of artistic expression and an educational tool. This is the third time in recent years that TPAC Education received the grant for its work with educators and teaching artists to engage students in theatre and to enhance their academic experiences.

Partnering with <u>Metro Nashville Public Schools' Art2STEM program</u> (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) TPAC Education created a program for 40 girls in middle school to explore facets of artistic technology, stagecraft, and production technique and to connect their creativity and interests in the arts to science, technology, engineering, and mathematics career opportunities.


The project included workshops on set design, the physics and application behind the fly system, and other aspects of work behind the scenes on *Mary Poppins*. Students also attended a performance of the musical at TPAC, where they interacted with members of the company and crew backstage. They then wrote reviews of the show's production design and technical aspects, comparing their own scenery designs with what they saw in *Mary Poppins*.

"I am extremely committed to the arts in education. Several studies show that students who do not get the opportunity to participate in the arts do not score as high on major tests – ACT, SAT, etc. The arts can be part of any subject. It's limitless! I have seen how students who were essentially 'written off' have found their niche in the arts and it has been life changing for them. The arts stimulate us in ways that we cannot imagine. They are vital to the education and success of well-rounded students. I sincerely believe the arts are for everyone."

Ted Welch and Tim McGraw were honored with the Applause Award, TPAC's highest honor, at an exquisite event on October 29, 2012, the annual Gala.



Tim McGraw has sold over 40 million units and dominated the charts with 32 #1 singles, including his latest, "Felt Good On My Lips," a bonus track from Number One Hits, his 2010 double CD collection. With 7.8 million spins at radio, he was the most-played artist of the past decade. His "Southern Voice" tour was the No. 1 country music tour of 2010. McGraw has won three GRAMMY® awards, 14 Academy of Country Music awards, 11 Country

Music Association awards, 10 American Music awards, three People's Choice awards and other honors. Also an accomplished actor, McGraw most recently appeared in The Weinstein Company's Dirty Girl. He previously has co-starred with Gwyneth Paltrow, Garrett Hedlund and Leighton Meester in Screen Gems' Country Strong, which filmed many scenes at TPAC. His other films include The Blind Side (2009), which was nominated for an Academy Award, Four Christmases (2008), The Kingdom (2007), Flicka (2006) and Friday Night Lights (2004).



Ted Welch has been a longtime patron and leader for arts organizations in Nashville and Tennessee. As the Commissioner of Finance and Administration, and Chief Operating Officer for the State of Tennessee, Ted was a key figure in the early planning and funding for the construction of TPAC. He has held numerous leadership positions within the Republican Party, including roles as the Finance Chairman for the Presidential Election Campaigns


of Ronald Reagan and George Bush. He is an investor in real estate and developer of office buildings, whose corporate board seats include First Bank and National Health Investors Corporation. He is the Treasurer of the board for the Tennessee Chamber of Commerce and the Arts and Business Council of Greater Nashville, in addition to other service to the community. Ted and his wife Colleen Conway-Welch (current TPAC board member), also known for her leadership in the arts, reside in Nashville and have three married daughters and five grandchildren.

Chenoweth originated the role of Glinda the Good Witch in Wicked on Broadway, earning a Tony Award nomination for Best Actress. She received a Tony Award for her role as Sally in You're A Good Man, Charlie Brown. Kristin won an Emmy for her portrayal of Olive Snook in the series Pushing Daisies, also appearing on television as April Rhodes in Glee and Annabeth Schott in The West Wing.

During the 2011-12 season TPAC and one of its longtime donors received special recognition.

- /// CAT Financial received the 2012 Education Bowtie Award from the Nashville Business and Arts Council for its support of TPAC Education.
- /// The Broadway League, the industry trade association, selected TPAC as one of four arts centers nationwide to pilot VIVA Broadway, a new initiative to increase Latin American audience attendance.
- /// TPAC's volunteer program honored by the certification in the first year of a new initiative: Excellence in Volunteer Engagement, coordinated by the City of Nashville, the Center for Nonprofit Management, and Hands On Nashville.
- /// Theatre Development Fund selected TPAC for a program to provide open captioning for hearing-impaired patrons at Broadway shows.
- /// TPAC received an award from the **Arc Tennessee** for inclusion of people with disabilities in the arts.
- /// A Brand Champion Award from the Nashville Convention and Visitors Bureau was won for "masterfully incorporating the Music City brand" into the Attic Sessions.
- /// TPAC was selected as a finalist for the **SunTrust Business Acumen Award** for the 2011 Salute to Excellence from the Center for Nonprofit Management.

Throughout the season, TPAC worked with more than 40 active community partners.

Together, we have worked on logistics and continue to partner to maximize open captioning for the audience.

War Memorial Auditorium is also a beautiful place for weddings and receptions.

TPAC's **Andrew Jackson Hall**, with its spacious backstage and fly space, is home to the annual HCA/TriStar Health Broadway at TPAC Series, productions of resident companies Nashville Ballet and Nashville Opera, and a wide variety of special engagements, including world renowned musicians and comedians.




