Report on Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Salvation Army Nashville, Tennessee Area Command, A Unit of the Salvation Army, A Georgia Corporation (the Area Command), a non-profit organization, which comprise the statements of financial position as of September 30, 2021 and 2020, and the related statements of activities and changes in net assets, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Area Command's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Area Command's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from, and relates directly to, the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

The Roster of Board of Directors and Leadership on page 1, which is the responsibility of management, is of nonaccounting nature and has not been subjected to the audit procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide assurance over the roster.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization and Purpose

The Salvation Army, founded in 1865, is a not-for-profit international religious organization and charitable movement organized and operated on a quasi-military pattern and is a branch of the Christian Church. Its membership includes officers (clergy), soldiers and adherents (laity), members of varied activity groups and volunteers who serve as advisors, associates and committed participants in its service functions.

The Salvation Army is an organization exempt from income taxation under Section 501 (a) as an entity described in Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended and is exempt from state income taxes under related state provisions.

The accompanying financial statements are summaries of the financial position, changes in net assets, and cash flows of The Salvation Army Nashville, Tennessee Area Command, A Unit of the Salvation Army, A Georgia Corporation, (the Area Command), an operating unit of the Southern Territory of The Salvation Army.

The Area Command operates a variety of programs including corps community centers that provide spiritual, educational and recreational services; homeless and emergency shelters; adult rehabilitation centers emergency disaster services; assistance for the poor, disabled, and retired; and camping activities.

Effective June 1, 2020, Murfreesboro Corps came under the Area Command's management and control. All assets, liabilities and related activity of Murfreesboro Corps came under the Area Command at book value.

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the Area Command are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting, under which revenue is recognized when earned rather than when collected and expenses are recognized when incurred rather than when disbursed.

Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the national accounting policies of The Salvation Army. These policies are consistent with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (U.S. GAAP).

In order to observe restrictions which donors place on grants and other gifts, as well as designations made by the Board of Trustees, all assets, liabilities and support and revenue are accounted for in the following net asset classifications:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions - Net assets that are not subject to donor imposed restrictions and may be designated for specific purposes or locations by actions of the Board of Trustees.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions - Net assets that are subject to donor-imposed restrictions that will be fulfilled either by actions of The Salvation Army or the passage of time or that include a stipulation that assets provided be retained and invested in perpetuity while permitting The Salvation Army to use all or part of the investment return on these assets for specified or unspecified purposes.

Measure of Operations

The Statements of Activities and Changes in Net Assets report changes in net assets, including changes in net assets from operating and non-operating activities. Operating activities consist of those items attributable to the Area Command's ongoing activities and interest and investment income. Non-operating activities are limited to resources that generate return from other investments, permanently restricted contributions, net assets released for capital expenditures, and other activities considered to be of a more unusual or non-recurring nature.

Split Interest Agreements

Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) guidelines require that the following instruments be recorded as contributions and net assets at the present value of their ultimate Salvation Army interest.

Perpetual Trusts - donors have established and funded trusts which are administered by organizations other than The Salvation Army. Under the terms of the trusts, The Salvation Army has the irrevocable right to receive the income earned on the trust assets in perpetuity. The Salvation Army does not control the assets held by a third party.

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

Charitable Remainder Trusts - in which donors have established and funded trusts under which specified distributions are to be made to designated beneficiaries over the trusts' terms. Upon termination of the trusts, Area Command receives a percentage of the assets remaining in the trusts. The assets in the trusts are assumed to earn a rate of 5% over the estimated lives of the trusts and are discounted at a rate of 2.05%.

Program and Supporting Services - Functional Expenses

The following program and supporting services are included in the accompanying financial statements on the Statements of Functional Expenses.

Program Services - includes activities carried out to fulfill the Area Command's mission and are organized around the spiritual, educational and recreational services, residential and institutional assistance, emergency disaster services.

Supporting Services - Management and General - relates to the overall direction of the Area Command. These expenses are not identifiable with a particular program, event or fundraising, but are indispensable to the conduct of those activities and are essential to the Area Command. Specific activities include organizational oversight, operation management, record keeping, budgeting, financing, and other administrative activities.

Supporting Services - Fundraising - includes cost of activities directed toward appeals for financial support and the cost of solicitations and creation and distribution of fundraising materials.

Classifications of Expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the Statements of Activities and Changes in Net Assets. Direct expenses, incurred for a single function, are allocated entirely to that function. Expenses applicable to more than one function are allocated on the basis of time and effort, square footage, or headcount. Personnel expense, travel, meetings and conferences are allocated based on time and effort. Professional fees, supplies, telephone, and postage are allocated on headcount, while occupancy, insurance, and depreciation are allocated based on square footage.

Use of Estimates

Management of the Area Command has made a number of estimates and assumptions relating to the reporting of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities to prepare these financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of these statements, cash equivalents are defined as short-term, highly liquid investments that are both readily convertible to known amounts of cash and having original maturities of three months or less.

Pledges Receivable

Unconditional pledges receivable are recorded at net realizable value. Pledges receivable that are expected to be collected after one year are recorded at the present value of estimated future cash flows and discounted using a credit-adjusted discount rate applicable to the year in which the pledge was made. Amortization of the discount is recorded as additional contribution revenue. An allowance for uncollectible pledges receivable is based on management's judgment, including such factors as prior collection history, subsequent collections, credit worthiness of donor and nature of fundraising activity. Pledges are written off when determined to be uncollectible. Conditional pledges receivable are not recognized until they become unconditional, that is, when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met. At September 30, 2021 and 2020, there was no allowance for uncollectible pledges and approximately \$444,000 and \$314,000, respectively, are greater than ninety days old.

Deposits Held by Territorial Headquarters

The Southern Territorial Headquarters has the responsibility for investment activity for all units within the Southern Territory. The portfolios related to net assets with donor restrictions are maintained on a pooled "mutual fund" accounting basis, with the total return being allocated to each participating account on a pro-rata basis.

Investment return earned on portfolios related to net assets without donor restrictions is distributed to the constituent accounts on the basis of a stated percentage of the monthly account balances during the year. Amounts so deposited may be withdrawn when required for use by the centers of operation. The excess (deficit) of investment income earned over amounts distributed is reported as unrestricted board designated income. The Board of Trustees of the Southern Territory of The Salvation Army generally designates the use of portions of these excess funds for specified projects for use within the territory.

The recognized captions for investments and the categories of earnings related to investments (interest and dividends, net appreciation (depreciation)) are retained in the statements and in the relevant footnotes for all funds held for The Salvation Army at territorial headquarters and divisional headquarters, so that the information required by U.S. GAAP may be reported for Area Command where appropriate in accustomed terms.

Investment income and net appreciation (depreciation) on investments of restricted contributions, are reported as follows:

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

As increases in permanently restricted net assets if the terms of the gift or the Territory's interpretation of relevant state law require that they be added back to the principal of the permanently restricted contributions.

- As increases in other net assets with donor restrictions if the terms of the gift or the Territory's interpretation of relevant state law impose restrictions on the current use of the investment income or net appreciation (depreciation).
- As increases (decreases) in net assets without donor restrictions in all other cases.
- Contributions to be received after one year are discounted to estimated net present value. Amortization of the discount is recorded as contribution revenue.

Fair Value Measurements

The Area Command follows FASB ASC 820-10, Fair Value Measurements, with respect to its financial assets and liabilities. Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Fair value should be based on the assumptions market participants would use when pricing an asset. U.S. GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes investments based on those assumptions. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets (observable inputs) and the lowest priority to an entity's assumptions (unobservable inputs). The Area Command groups assets at fair value in three levels, based on the markets in which the assets and liabilities are traded, and the reliability of the assumptions used to determine fair value. These levels are as follows:

Level 1 - Unadjusted quoted market prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets as of the measurement date.

Level 2 - Other observable inputs, either directly or indirectly, including:

- Quoted prices for similar assets/liabilities in active markets;
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets in non-active markets;
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset/liability; and,
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by other observable market data.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs that cannot be corroborated by observable market data.

U.S. GAAP requires disclosure of an estimate of fair value of certain financial instruments. The Area Command's significant financial instruments are cash and cash equivalents,

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

accounts and grants receivable, pledges receivable, deposits held by territorial headquarters, and other short-term assets and liabilities. For these financial instruments, carrying values approximate fair value. The fair value measurements and valuation techniques related to the Area Command's financial assets are further discussed in Note 4.

Unconditional Promises to Give

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the Area Command that is, in substance, unconditional.

Accounts Receivable

The Area Command uses the allowance method to determine uncollectible accounts receivable. Management's estimate of doubtful accounts is based on historical collection experience and a review of the current status of accounts receivable. There was no allowance for doubtful accounts at September 30, 2021 and 2020. It is reasonably possible that management's estimate of the allowance for doubtful accounts could change. Receivables are charged against the allowance when management believes the collectibility of the receivable is unlikely. For the years ended September 30, 2021 and 2020, there was no bad debt expense. Accounts receivable are considered delinquent after ninety days. Late fees and interest are not assessed on delinquent accounts. It is not the policy of the Area Command to place a customer on non-accrual status.

Land, Buildings, Improvements and Equipment

The Area Command's property consists of land, building, building improvements, furniture, fixtures, and equipment.

Property and equipment are recorded at cost, or at appraised value if donated. Depreciation is computed by the straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the related assets. A half year of depreciation is charged in the year of acquisition or completion of construction. A half year of depreciation is charged in the year of disposition. The Area Command capitalizes items that are greater than or equal to \$10,000 and expenses items under \$10,000. The Area Command uses the direct expensing method to account for planned major maintenance activities. Provision is made for major future costs of property maintenance and replacement of vehicles and some equipment by transfer of operating net assets to Board designated unrestricted net assets.

In accordance with FASB ASC 360-10, Accounting for the Impairment or Disposal of Long-Lived Assets, the Area Command reviews the carrying value of property and equipment for impairment whenever events and circumstances indicate that the carrying value of an asset may not be recoverable from the estimated future cash flows expected to result from its use and eventual disposition. In cases where undiscounted expected future cash flows are less than the carrying value, an impairment loss is recognized equal to an amount by which the carrying value exceeds the fair value of assets. The factors considered by management in performing this assessment include current operating results, trends, and prospects, as

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

well as the effects of obsolescence, demand, competition, and other economic factors. No impairments have been recognized on any property at September 30, 2021 and 2020.

Revenue Recognition

Revenues are recognized when control of the promised goods or services is transferred to the customer in an amount that reflects consideration the Area Command expects to be entitled to in exchange for transferring those goods or services.

Revenue is recognized based on the following five step model:

- Identification of the contract with the customer
- Identification of the performance obligations in the contract
- Determination of the transaction price
- Allocation of the transaction price
- Recognition of revenue when, or as, the Area Command satisfies a performance obligation

The Area Command's revenues primarily consist of contributions and grants.

Contributions are recognized when received and are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as an increase in net assets without donor restrictions if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the contribution is recognized. All other donor restricted contributions are reported as an increase in net assets with donor restrictions, depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends, or the purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the Statements of Activities and Changes in Net Assets as net assets released from restrictions.

Grant revenue results from agreements, typically with government agencies, that fund specific activities of the Area Command. The grants are of three primary types: unconditional contributions, conditional contributions, and exchange transactions. An agreement is a contribution if its primary purpose is to enable the Area Command to provide a service to or for the general public rather than to serve the direct needs of the granting or contracting party. In other words, the agreement is a contribution if any benefit to the granting or contracting party is indirect and insubstantial as compared to the public benefit. The Area Command recognizes grant and contract revenue associated with unconditional contributions without donor stipulations as revenue and net assets without donor restrictions. Unconditional contributions with a donor stipulation that limits their use are reported as revenue and net assets with donor restrictions. When a donor stipulated restriction ends or a purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the Statements of Activities and Changes in Net Assets as net assets released from restrictions.

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

The Area Command recognizes grant and contract revenue associated with conditional contributions as earned when the conditions are met (allowable expenses have been incurred or as milestones are met) as net assets without donor restrictions. Any unused funds are forfeited, and if any expenditures are unallowed, the Area Command is required to refund the amounts drawn down. In contrast, if the grant or contract provides a benefit directly to the granting or contracting party, the agreement is an exchange transaction with a customer.

Grant revenue from federal agencies is subject to independent audit under the Uniform Guidance and review by grantor agencies. The review could result in the disallowance of expenditures under the terms of grant, or reductions of future grant funds. Based on prior experience, the Area Command's management believes that costs ultimately disallowed, if any, would not materially affect the financial position of the Area Command.

Income Taxes

The Salvation Army has obtained a determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service effective October 1955, which qualifies the Area Command as a tax-exempt organization under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) and, accordingly, is exempt from federal or state income taxes. The Area Command is not classified as a private foundation.

The Salvation Army follows FASB ASC 740-10, Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes, as it relates to uncertain tax positions. This applies to positions taken or expected to be taken in a tax return where there is uncertainty about whether a tax position will ultimately be sustained upon examination. The Salvation Army has evaluated its tax positions and determined that it does not have uncertain tax positions that meet this criterion. There are no tax penalties or interest in the accompanying financial statements.

Donation In-Kind and Contributed Services

Material donations in-kind items used in the Area Command's programs (e.g., vehicle, free rent, equipment, etc.) and donated goods distributed (clothing, furniture, foodstuffs, etc.) are recorded at their estimated fair value as income and expense at the time the items are placed into service or distributed. Contributed land, buildings, and equipment are recorded at fair value at the date of donation as support and revenue without donor restrictions unless the use of such contributed assets is restricted by a donor-imposed restriction.

Contributed services are reported as contributions at their fair value if such services create or enhance nonfinancial assets, or would typically need to be purchased if not provided by contribution or require specialized skills and are provided by individuals possessing such specialized skills. In addition, the appropriate value of donated services of individuals is recorded as an expense when such services qualify for cost reimbursement from third-party providers.

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

Bequests

The Salvation Army has been named as the beneficiary of several estates. The amounts to be received from the proceeds of these estates are not currently determinable and no amounts have been recorded in the accompanying financial statements.

Restricted Endowments Funds

The Uniform Prudent Management Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) was enacted in Georgia effective July 1, 2008. The Not-for-Profit topic of the FASB ASC provides guidance on the net asset classification of donor-restricted endowment funds for a non-profit organization that is subject to an enacted version of UPMIFA. It also requires a description of the governing board's interpretation of the law that underlies the organization's net asset classification of donor-restricted endowment funds, a description of the organization's policies for the appropriation of endowment assets for expenditures (its endowment spending policies), a description of the organization's endowment investment policies, and additional disclosures not previously required.

Deferred Revenue

Deferred revenue consists of advanced payments received from various sources including private and federal grants and other governmental agencies classified as conditional contributions. Revenue from these grants is recognized as the expenses are incurred and the related services performed.

Advertising

Advertising is expensed as incurred.

Reclassification

Certain amounts in the 2020 financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the 2021 presentation.

Note 2 - Liquidity and Availability

The following reflects the Area Command's financial assets as of September 30, 2021 and 2020, reduced by amounts not available for general use because of contractual or donor-imposed restrictions within one year of September 30, 2021 and 2020. Amounts not available include amounts set aside for long-term investing in the quasi-endowment that could be drawn upon if the Board of Trustees approves that action. However, amounts already appropriated from either the donor-restricted endowment or quasi-endowment for general expenditure within one year of the Statements of Financial Position date have not been subtracted as unavailable.

The Area Command is substantially supported by restricted contributions. Because a donor's restriction requires resources to be used in a particular manner or in a future period, the Area Command must maintain sufficient resources to meet those responsibilities to its donors. Thus, financial assets may not be available for general expenditures within one year. As part of The Area Command's liquidity management, it has a policy to structure its financial assets to be available as its general expenditures and other obligations come due. In addition, the Area Command invests cash in excess of daily requirements in short-term investments. Occasionally, the Board of Trustees designates a portion of any operating surplus to its liquidity reserve, which was \$1,691,630 and \$1,404,451, respectively, as of September 30, 2021 and 2020. There is a fund established by the Board of Trustees that may be drawn upon in the event of financial distress or an immediate liquidity need resulting from events outside the typical life cycle of converting financial assets to cash or settling financial liabilities. In the event of an unanticipated liquidity need, The Area Command also could draw upon \$10,000,000 of available lines of credit or its quasi-endowment fund.

Note 3 - Deposits Held by Territorial Headquarters

The Salvation Army policy requires that the investment of assets for all centers of operation may be made only through the corporate portfolio under the administration of the Board of Trustees of the Southern Territory of The Salvation Army. Assets that are restricted by donors for use in a center of operation are invested on a pooled mutual fund basis and

receive total net rate of return. The Area Command's pro rata share of these invested assets is recorded as deposits held by territorial headquarters in the financial statements. These deposits are measured on a recurring basis at fair value at the reporting date using quoted prices in active markets for identical assets (Level 1).

Assets which are remitted for investment by a center of operation or are designated for the use of a center of operation receive a fixed rate of interest as determined by the Board of Trustees of The Southern Territory of The Salvation Army.

Note 7 - Pension Plan

Employee Pension Plan - Eligible employees participate in The Salvation Army Pension Plan (the Plan) with other Salvation Army territories which provides for death, disability and retirement benefits. The Plan is a defined contribution, money purchase plan.

Annual contributions to the Plan are based on a stipulated percentage (3% in fiscal 2021 and 2020) of employees' salaries. The Area Command incurred \$20,442 and \$29,177, respectively, of expense under this plan in fiscal 2021 and 2020.

Officers' Retirement Provision - The Salvation Army has a noncontributory retirement provision for officers, which provides retirement benefits and certain health care and death benefits to retired officers, as defined by The Salvation Army policy governing such benefits. The corporate headquarters has total responsibility for the administration of retirement benefits. Retirement allowances are determined based upon active officer allowances and length of service. They are self-funded principally by annual assessments to all centers of operation, by designated portions from legacy income, by earnings on assets designated for retirement benefits, and by special appropriations. Amounts charged to the Area Command and included in expenses for this provision were approximately \$41,000 and \$38,000, respectively, in fiscal 2021 and 2020.

Note 9 - Endowment

The Area Command is a unit of the Southern Territory, which has sole authority for the receipt, management and investment of all endowment funds credited to units in the Southern Territory. The Southern Territory's endowment fund consists of approximately eight individual funds established for a variety of purposes. Its endowment includes both donor-restricted endowment funds and funds designated by the Board of Trustees to function as endowments. As required by U.S. GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Board of Trustees to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Interpretation of Relevant Law - The responsibility for investment of all institutional funds in the Southern Territory is solely the responsibility of the Board of Trustees of the Southern Territory. The interpretation by the Board of Trustees of relevant law is stated as follows:

The Southern Territory is subject to the UPMIFA and thus classifies earnings in its donor-restricted endowment funds as net assets with donor restrictions because those net assets are time restricted until the Board of Trustees appropriates such amounts for expenditure. Most of those net assets are also subject to purpose restrictions that must be met before reclassifying those net assets to net assets without donor restrictions. The Board of Trustees has interpreted UPMIFA as not

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

requiring the maintenance or purchasing power of the original gift amount contributed to the endowment fund, unless explicit donor restrictions to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, when reviewing its donor-restricted endowment funds, the Southern Territory considers a fund to be underwater if the fair value of the fund is less than the sum of (a) the original value of initial and subsequent gifts donated to the fund and (b) any accumulations to the fund that are required to be maintained in perpetuity in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument. The Southern Territory has interpreted UPMIFA to permit spending from underwater funds in accordance with prudent measures required under the law. Additionally, in accordance with UPMIFA, the Board of Trustees considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds:

- The duration and preservation of the fund
- The purpose of the The Salvation Army and the donor-restricted endowment fund
- General economic conditions
- The possible effects of inflation and deflation
- The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments
- Other resources of the The Salvation Army
- The investment policies of the The Salvation Army

Spending Policy - The spending policy and how the investment objectives relate to the spending policy, which is applicable to the endowments herewith presented, are stated as follows:

The Southern Territory has a policy of allocating an amount available for appropriation for spending each year equal to the weighted average of the prior-year's spending allocation adjusted for inflation plus a percentage of the endowment fund's fair value at the calendar year-end preceding the fiscal year in which the appropriation is planned. The prior year's spending allocation is weighted at 60% and the percentage of the fund's fair value is weighted at 40%. The percentage of the fund's fair value varies in a band from 0% to 7%, depending on the ratio of the fund's fair value to the purchasing power of the endowment gifts as measured by changes in CPI-U. The median percentage is 4%, and the minimum and maximum of the band are reached at 50% and 200% ratios of the fund's fair value to the endowment gift(s') purchasing power, respectively. With long-term real growth expected through investment returns, the expected long-term average percentage rate is 4.5%. Accordingly, over the long-term, the Southern Territory expects the current spending policy to allow its endowments to maintain or grow the purchasing power of the endowment assets held in perpetuity or for a specified term as well as to provide additional real growth through new gifts.

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters - The return objectives and risk parameters applicable to the endowments herewith presented are as follows:

The Southern Territory has adopted investment policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment while seeking to maintain the purchasing power of the endowment assets. Endowment assets include those assets of donor-restricted funds that the organization must hold in perpetuity or for a donor-specified period(s) as well as board-designated funds. Under this policy, as approved by the Board of Trustees, the endowment assets are invested in a manner that is intended to produce results that exceed the price and yield results of appropriate benchmarks without putting the assets at imprudent risk.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives - The strategies employed for achieving objectives applicable to the endowments herewith presented are as follows:

To satisfy its long-term objectives, the Southern Territory relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both capital appreciation (realized and unrealized) and current yield (interest and dividends). The Southern Territory targets a diverse asset allocation that places a greater emphasis on equity-based investments to achieve its long-term return objectives within prudent risk constraints.

Underwater Endowment Funds - From time to time the fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or UPMIFA requires The Salvation Army to retain as a fund of perpetual duration.

There's no underwater endowment funds related to the Area Command as of September 30, 2021 and 2020.

Note 10 - Grant Revenue

For the years ended September 30, 2021 and 2020, \$6,438,531 and \$780,498, respectively, of grants received from Federal (conditional contributions) were recognized as revenue.

As of September 30, 2021 and 2020, conditional contributions amounts totaling \$146,300 and \$442,078, respectively, were received and not recognized as revenue but were included in deferred revenue. Conditional contributions which have not been received but promised for future years total approximately \$3,794,000 and \$3,977,000, respectively, at September 30, 2021 and 2020.

Note 11 - Related Party Transactions

The Area Command is assessed an administrative charge by The Salvation Army Kentucky-Tennessee Divisional Headquarters for support services provided by the Kentucky-Tennessee Divisional Headquarters and the Southern Territorial Headquarters to the Area Command. Support services provided by Divisional and Territorial Headquarters include program, personnel, business and social services. Expenses reflected for these services were \$2,033,353 and \$960,682, respectively, in fiscal 2021 and 2020.

Employees of The Salvation Army are provided health benefits under a self-insured program, which is administered by a third-party claims administrator. Amounts charged to the Area Command and included in expenses were \$326,966 and \$259,245, respectively, in fiscal 2021 and 2020.

The Salvation Army maintains self-insurance programs for general liability, automobile, workers' compensation and property coverage. The programs, which are administered by the Southern Territorial Headquarters, are intended to provide coverage for claims arising in all centers of operation. Amounts charged to the Area Command and included in expenses were \$172,823 and \$152,503, respectively, in fiscal 2021 and 2020.

Note 12 - Board Designated Restrictions

At September 30, 2021 and 2020, the Board has designated a total of \$4,151,940 and \$3,842,186, respectively, of investments and cash and cash equivalents for capital improvement and general operating needs which is included in net assets without donor restrictions. At September 30, 2021 and 2020, the Board has also designated \$88,733 and \$63,418, respectively, of cash for property and equipment maintenance for the subsequent year, which is also included in net assets without donor restrictions.

Note 13 - Concentrations of Credit Risk

At September 30, 2021, four (4) organizations represent 70% of grants receivable, one (1) organization and one (1) individual represents 42% of pledges receivable. At September 30, 2020, one (1) organization represents 53% of grants receivable, one (1) organization and one (1) individual represents 41% of pledges receivable.

Note 14 - Risk on Uninsured Cash

The standard Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation insurance amount is \$250,000 per depositor, per insured bank; and therefore, amounts in excess of \$250,000 held by the Area Command during the years ended September 30, 2021 and 2020 were uninsured and uncollateralized. The Area Command has not experienced any losses in such accounts and management believes the Area Command is not exposed to any significant credit risk related to cash.

Investments are subject to market risk, the risk inherent in a fluctuating market. The broker/dealer that is the custodian of the Area Command's securities is covered by the Securities Investor Protection Corporation (SIPC), which provides limited protection to investors. SIPC coverage is limited to specified investor-owned securities (notes, bonds, mutual funds, investment company securities, and registered securities) held by an insolvent SIPC member at the time a supervising trustee is appointed. The SIPC also protects against unauthorized trading in the Area Command's security account. SIPC coverage is limited to \$500,000 per customer, including \$250,000 for cash that is on deposit as the result of a security transaction. The SIPC protection does not insure against market risk.

Note 15 - Commitments and Contingencies

In December 2019, an outbreak of a novel strain of coronavirus (COVID-19) originated in Wuhan, China and has since spread to other countries, including the U.S. On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization characterized COVID-19 as a pandemic. In addition,

multiple jurisdictions in the U.S. have declared a state of emergency. In March 2020, the Area Command began having virtual consulting sessions, and fund raising events were canceled for the remainder of the fiscal year. During fiscal year 2021, the Area Command provided virtual services to individuals and families when the in-person opportunities were limited. Fund-raising events were virtual or hybrid with limited in-person participation. Future potential impacts may include disruptions or restrictions on the Area Command's employees' ability to work, or the Area Command's participants' ability to participate in the consulting sessions. Changes to the operating environment may increase operating costs. The further effects of these issues are unknown.

Note 16 - Subsequent Events

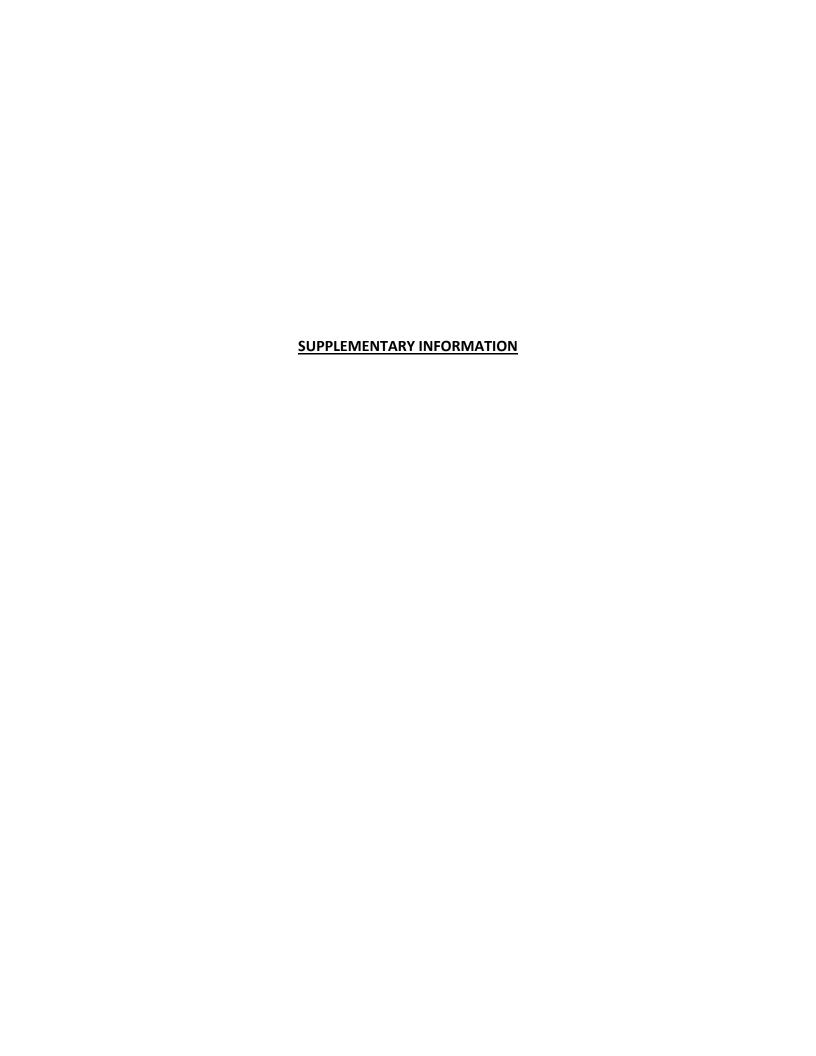
The Area Command has evaluated subsequent events through March 30, 2022, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.

During March 2022, the Area Command is in process of purchasing a parcel of land in Nashville with an estimated value of \$3,750,000.

Note 17 - Accounting Standards Not Yet Adopted

In February 2016, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2016-02, *Leases* (ASC 842), which requires lessees to recognize assets and liabilities for most leases. The recognition, measurement, and presentation of expenses and cash flows arising from a lease by a lessee is not expected to significantly change under such guidance. The standard, as amended, will be effective for annual reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2021. Accordingly, this ASU will be effective for the Area Command for the year ending September 30, 2023. The Area Command is currently evaluating the impact that adoption of this ASU will have on the Area Command's financial position and results of operations.

In September 2020, the FASB issued ASU 2020-07, *Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958): Presentation and Disclosures by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets.* The purpose of the ASU 2020-07 is to clarify the presentation and disclosure of contributed nonfinancial assets with an intention to provide the reader of the financial statements a clearer understanding of the types of nonfinancial assets received and how they are used and recognized by the organization. The standard will be effective for annual reporting periods beginning after June 15, 2021. Accordingly, this ASU will be effective for the Area Command for the year ending September 30, 2022. The Area Command is currently evaluating the impact that adoption of this ASU will have on the Area Command's financial statements and related notes to the financial statements.

Notes to Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards

Note 1 - Basis of Presentation and Significant Accounting Policies

The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (the Schedule) includes the federal grant activity of the Area Command under programs of the federal government received directly and passed through from the State of Tennessee as well as other state and local assistance for the year ended September 30, 2021. The information in the Schedule is presented in accordance with the requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance). Because the Schedule presents only a selected portion of the operations of the Area Command, it is not intended to and does not present the financial position, changes in net assets (deficit), or cash flows of the Area Command.

The Schedule is prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. Such expenditures are recognized following the cost principles contained in the Uniform Guidance, wherein certain types of expenditures are not allowable or are limited as to reimbursement. The Area Command has elected not to use the 10% deminimis indirect cost rate allowed under the Uniform Guidance.

The Area Command did not pass any awards through to sub-recipients for the year ended September 30, 2021.

The Area Command received Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) funding from the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County in July 2020 before the Contract was signed on October 14, 2020. The award permited expenditures retroactive back to March 2020 and therefore the financial statements at September 30, 2020 included \$209,989 not included on the prior Schedule for September 30, 2020 but have been included on the current Schedule for September 30, 2021.

The Area Command received Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) funding from the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County in October 2020. The award permited expenditures retroactive back to March 2020 and therefore the financial statements at September 30, 2020 included \$223,448 not included on the prior Schedule for September 30, 2020 but have been included on the current Schedule for September 30, 2021.

Note 2 - Contingencies

These programs are subject to financial and compliance audits by grantor agencies. The amount, if any, of expenditures that may be disallowed by the grantor agencies cannot be determined at this time, although the Area Command expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

MANAGEMENT'S CORRECTIVE ACTION PLAN The Salvation Army Nashville Area Command

September 31, 2021 Audit

The Salvation Army Nashville Area Command respectfully submits the following corrective action plan for the year ended September 30, 2021.

The findings from the Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs are discussed below. The findings are numbered consistently with the numbers assigned in the schedule.

Finding No. 2021-01

Recommendation: The Area Command should employ or contract sufficient resources to ensure the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (SEFA) is properly stated.

Views of responsible officials and planned corrective actions: Management agrees with the finding. This oversight was created by the city awarding federal funds. This will be remedied by the review of SFDA codes listed on the contract agreement.

On December 1, 2021, the Area Command has hired new Finance Director, Larry Bergholz, with 30+ years of experience in finance and accounting in non-profit arena. On February 2022, Management began the process of restructuring its grants and related accounting program to ensure the SEFA is properly stated going forward.

Recommendation: The Area Command management should evaluate the cost and time effectiveness for the Area Command to draft the annual financial statement reports.

Views of responsible officials and planned corrective actions: Nashville Area Command operates under the organizational structure of Salvation Army Georgia Corporation.

The Area Command provides the auditors with the information needed to prepare the year-end financial statements and related notes; and reviews, approves, and takes responsibility for the report.

The Territorial Headquarters of The Salvation Army fulfill the requirements of year-end financial reporting; however, the local area commands are not required to prepare year-end financials as separate entities. All year-end reporting is consolidated at the Territorial Headquarter level.

Finding No. 2021-03

Recommendation: The Area Command management should implement controls and procedures to ensure compliance with the grant requirement.

Views of responsible officials and planned corrective actions: Management agrees with the finding. A two-month window of pandemic response brought finance department beyond capacity.

The Management has begun the process of strengthening the program review procedures to ensure that only allowable expenditures are charged to the grants and all supporting documents for the charges are properly maintained.
