#### **INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT**

Board of Directors Tennessee Voices for Children, Inc. Nashville, Tennessee

#### REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Tennessee Voices for Children, Inc. which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, and the related statements of activities, cash flows and functional expenses, for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

#### MANAGEMENT'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### **AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITY**

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### **OPINION**

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Tennessee Voices for Children, Inc. as of June 30, 2013 and 2012, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards, as required by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. The schedule of expenditures of state awards is also presented for additional analysis, and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

#### OTHER REPORTING REQUIRED BY GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### General

Tennessee Voices for Children, Inc. ("TVC" or the "Agency") is a statewide advocacy agency for families whose children have emotional, behavioral, and/or mental health issues. Its mission is to bridge the gap between professionals and family members so that they can work as a team to do what is best for the child and family. TVC takes an active role in the development of family friendly policies and encourages and supports family involvement on advisory boards such as the statewide Mental Health Planning Council, Behavioral Health Organizations, advisory councils, and community planning groups. Funding for TVC's services is provided principally by federal and state grants and certain contract revenues.

#### Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements present the financial position and changes in net assets of TVC on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

Resources are classified as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted net assets, based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions, as follows:

- Unrestricted net assets are free of donor-imposed restrictions. All revenues, gains and losses that are not temporarily or permanently restricted by donors are included in this classification. All expenditures are reported in the unrestricted class of net assets, since the use of restricted contributions in accordance with the donors' stipulations results in the release of the restriction.
- Temporarily restricted net assets are limited as to use by donor-imposed restrictions that expire with the passage of time or that can be satisfied by use for the specific purpose.
- Permanently restricted net assets are amounts required by donors to be held in perpetuity, including gifts requiring that the principal be invested and the income or specific portions thereof be used for operations.

TVC had no temporarily or permanently restricted net assets as of June 30, 2013 or 2012.

#### Contributions and Support

Contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Amounts received that are restricted by the donor for future periods or for specific purposes are reported as temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support that increases those net asset classes. When a restriction is fulfilled (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted and reported in the Statement of Activities as net assets released from restrictions.

TVC receives grant revenues from various federal, state and local agencies. Grant revenue is recognized in the period a liability is incurred for eligible expenditures under the terms of the grant. Grant funds received prior to expenditure are recorded initially as deferred revenue.

TVC reports any gifts of equipment or materials as unrestricted support unless explicit donor restrictions specify how the assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions as to how the assets are to be used or funds restricted for the acquisition of long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Expirations of donor restrictions are recognized when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

#### Conference Revenue

TVC holds a biennial conference for which revenue is recognized as income when the related event occurs. Any conference revenue received in advance is reported as deferred revenue.

#### Cash

Cash consists principally of checking account balances.

#### Investments

Investments consist of money market funds, shares of a mutual fund and certificates of deposit. Money market funds and mutual funds are carried at their quoted market value on the last business day of the reporting period. Certificates of deposit are reported at cost, plus any accrued interest. Changes in unrealized gains and losses are recognized currently in the Statement of Activities for the year.

#### Fair Value Measurements

TVC classifies its investments based on a hierarchy consisting of: Level 1 (valued using quoted prices from active markets for identical assets), Level 2 (not traded on an active market but for which observable market inputs are readily available), and Level 3 (valued based on significant unobservable inputs).

An asset's or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value on a recurring basis:

Investments - Where quoted prices are available in an active market, securities are classified within Level 1 of the valuation hierarchy. Level 1 securities include highly liquid securities and certain other products, such as mutual funds. If quoted market prices are not available, then fair values are estimated by using pricing models, quoted prices of securities with similar characteristics, or discounted cash flows and are classified within Level 2 of the valuation hierarchy. In certain cases where there is limited activity, or less transparency around inputs to the valuation, securities are classified within Level 3 of the valuation hierarchy.

There have been no changes in the valuation methodologies used at June 30, 2013 and 2012.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while TVC believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with that of other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in different fair value measurements at the reporting date.

#### Allowance for Uncollectible Accounts/Bad Debts

An allowance for uncollectible receivables is not provided in the financial statements based on management's assessment of specific accounts and historical collection experience.

#### Property, Building and Equipment

Property, building and equipment are reported at cost at the date of purchase or at estimated fair value at the date of gift to TVC. TVC's policy is to capitalize expenditures with a cost of \$5,000 or more and an estimated useful life greater than one year. Depreciation is calculated by the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets as follows: five to seven years for furniture and equipment and thirty-nine years for the building and improvements.

#### **Donated Services**

TVC's policy is to record support and expenses for contributed services that require specialized skills and would be purchased if not provided by the donor, at the estimated fair value of the services received.

#### Program and Supporting Services

The following program and supporting services are included in the accompanying financial statements:

<u>Program Services</u> - include programs to improve and expand services related to the emotional and behavioral well-being of children. Some of TVC's programs are:

- <u>Early Connections Network</u> the purpose of the Early Connections Network is to build a system of care for young children, birth to five, with social, emotional and behavioral needs.
- <u>JustCare Family Network</u> provides a service infrastructure to serve the needs of families of children and youth with serious emotional disturbance in Shelby County, Tennessee. The program is family-driven and includes community-based mental health delivery that engages youth and their families. Youth engagement and community outreach are enhanced through high fidelity wraparound services to families and children, partnerships with local secular and faith-based youth organizations, as well as partnerships with the schools, traditional service providers, policy makers, and community natural support services.
- K-Town Youth Empowerment Network ("K-Town") provides youth-guided and family-driven wraparound services to youth in Knox County, Tennessee with Serious Emotional Disturbance or Serious Mental Illness and their families. K-Town focuses on transition aged youth (ages 14-21 yrs.), incorporating family, youth and mental health supports with a high fidelity wraparound approach. The initiative also includes an active Youth in Action Council and comprehensive Family Advocacy programs.
- Muletown/South Central System of Care ("South Central SOC") provides high fidelity wraparound services to families of children with serious emotional disturbance at risk of out-of-home placement and develops a coordinated system of services through partnerships among agencies, schools, and parents that will enable families to maintain children with complex needs at home and in the community. The program is a Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration ("SAMHSA") funded system of care demonstration site operating in South Central Tennessee. The program ended in September 2012. Expenses for the year ended June 30, 2013 are included in Other Program Services on the Statement of Functional Expenses.

#### Program and Supporting Services (continued):

#### Program Services (continued):

- Intensive In-Home Family Preservation Services ("Family Connection") provides families the tools they need to maintain children and youth with complex needs at home, in school, and in the community. The program is family-driven, providing assistance in navigating the child-serving systems, advocacy, support, and therapeutic skill-building to prevent placement outside the home to a higher level of care. Program staff ensures that caregivers are an integral part of the intervention at all stages.
- <u>Statewide Family Support Network</u> ("SFSN") provides valuable support, information and training to parents and caregivers across the state, empowering them to successfully "navigate" the complex child-serving systems to obtain the services necessary for their children and youth with emotional and behavioral disorders. SFSN staff provides direct assistance, support groups, information and skill-based training, family representation on over 145 councils and coalitions, Youth in Action Council facilitation, and outreach to schools, mental health providers, and policy-makers in Tennessee.
- <u>Early Childhood Programs</u> provides on-site consultation and training to parents and staff associated with childcare and Head Start programs throughout Tennessee. Program staff is also involved in state and national research to identify effective strategies for working with young children with challenging behaviors.
- Other Program Services the significant program included in this category for the year ended June 30, 2012 was:

<u>Team Tennessee</u> - promotes the positive social and emotional development of young children. Team Tennessee succeeds in its efforts through a cross-agency collaborative professional development system, including community based training, continuing teacher education and higher education. This program ended during the June 30, 2012 fiscal year.

There were no individually significant programs included in this category for the year ended June 30, 2013.

#### **Supporting Services:**

<u>Management and General</u> - relates to the overall direction of the organization. These expenses are not identifiable with a particular program or with fundraising, but are indispensable to the conduct of those activities and are essential to the organization. Specific activities include organization oversight, business management, recordkeeping, budgeting, financing, and other administrative activities.

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

#### Allocation of Functional Expenses

Expenses that can be directly attributed to a particular function are charged to that function. Expenses that relate to more than one function are allocated among applicable functions on the basis of objective evaluation of financial and nonfinancial data or reasonable subjective methods determined by management.

#### **Income Taxes**

TVC qualifies as a not-for-profit organization exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, income taxes are not provided.

TVC files a U.S. Federal Form 990 for organizations exempt from income tax. TVC's returns for years prior to fiscal year end June 30, 2011 are no longer open to examination.

Management performs an evaluation of all income tax positions taken or expected to be taken in the course of preparing TVC's income tax returns to determine whether the income tax positions meet a "more likely than not" standard of being sustained under examination by the applicable taxing authorities. Management has performed its evaluation of all income tax positions taken on all open income tax returns and has determined that there were no positions taken that do not meet the "more likely than not" standard. Accordingly, there are no provisions for income taxes, penalties or interest receivable or payable relating to uncertain income tax positions in the accompanying financial statements.

#### Use of Estimates in the Preparation of Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### **Events Occurring After Reporting Date**

The Agency has evaluated events and transactions that occurred between June 30, 2013 and January 9, 2014, the date the financial statements were available to be issued, for possible recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

#### Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to prior year amounts in order to be comparative with the current year presentation.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

#### JUNE 30, 2013 AND 2012

#### NOTE 2 - CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK AND OFF-BALANCE-SHEET RISK

Grants receivable represent concentrations of credit risk to the extent the grants are receivable from concentrated sources. TVC receives over 95% of its funding from federal, state and local grants and contracts.

The Agency maintains cash balances at financial institutions whose accounts are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation ("FDIC") up to statutory limits. At times, the Agency's deposits at financial institutions may exceed federally insured limits.

Certain cash and securities held in broker/dealer accounts are insured by the Securities Investor Protection Corporation ("SIPC"), up to \$500,000 per broker/dealer (including a maximum of \$250,000 for cash claims), in certain circumstances such as fraud or failure of the institution. The SIPC does not insure against market risk.

In August 2007, TVC entered into a loan agreement with a financial institution to finance the purchase of the Agency's office building. #### **NOTE 9 - CONTINGENCIES**

The Agency has received various government grants for specific purposes that are subject to review and audit by the grantor agencies. Although such audits could result in disallowance of expenditures, management believes that any required reimbursements would not be significant. Accordingly, no provision has been made for potential reimbursements to grantors.

#### NOTE 10 - EMPLOYEE BENEFIT PLANS

TVC sponsors the Tennessee Voices for Children 403(b) Plan (the "Plan") under Section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code established on January 1, 2009. All employees are eligible to make elective deferrals on their date of hire. Upon completion of three months of service, employees become eligible for matching and nonelective contributions. TVC may make discretionary matching and nonelective contributions to the Plan. TVC's discretionary match was 2% for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012. TVC also made nonelective contributions to the Plan in 2013 and 2012. Total contributions amounted to \$26,741 and \$97,727 for the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

We consider the deficiency described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as 2013-1 to be a material weakness.

#### **COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether TVC's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards* and which are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as item 2013-1.

#### **TVC'S RESPONSE TO FINDINGS**

TVC's response to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. TVC's response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

Status:

This finding was resolved during 2013.

#### **CURRENT YEAR**

# 2013-1 Internal control over certain accounting transactions and financial reporting and compliance with allowable costs

#### Criteria:

Management is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over financial reporting so that financial statements are complete, accurate, and presented in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

#### Statement of Condition/Cause/Context:

Personnel involved in the accounting process did not periodically reconcile and review for correctness certain asset and liability accounts to ensure accounts were properly recorded. In addition, a detail of balances included in such accounts was not maintained. As a result, incorrect adjustments were made by accounting personnel and therefore, significant audit adjustments were proposed by the audit team and approved by management to properly present the financial statements in accordance with GAAP. A summary of the impact of these adjustments is as follows:

- The health and supplemental insurance and 403B contribution expenses were not correctly recorded during the year and as a result, expenses were overstated by approximately \$115,500, for which federal and state grantors were overcharged by approximately \$71,000.
- A reduction of a valid accrued expense was recorded for approximately \$84,000 due to a lack of detail supporting the components of accrued liability accounts. The accountant recorded this entry as a prior period adjustment by reducing net assets. In addition, other liability accounts had not been reconciled, which resulted in a net decrease in net assets of approximately \$4,700.
- The collection of insurance proceeds was recorded as additional revenue instead of reducing the previously recognized and recorded receivable for approximately \$16,000.

#### Effect:

Accounting records did not properly account for certain transactions of TVC during 2013, and as a result grants were improperly charged.

#### Recommendation:

TVC's accounting team should maintain detail support of each account, and reconcile and review accounts monthly to ensure that all balance sheet accounts are properly stated.

#### Management's Response:

Management understands the findings and has taken steps to ensure that they will not re-occur related to the benefit expenses. A recurring entry should have been removed when we modified our benefits in 2012 but was not, thus resulting in the overstatement of benefits expensed. We also agree that there was an error in how the insurance proceeds were recorded.

The accounting department did not have clear documentation of the detail of amounts accrued in the accrued expense account, which resulted in an erroneous entry being made during the audit period. Appropriate separation of accrued expenses into accounts with descriptive names has subsequently been done and will prevent this problem in the future.

#### Statement of Condition/Cause/Context:

There was no review or reconciliation process in place for certain liability and related expense accounts to ensure compliance with allowable cost requirements.

#### **Questioned Costs/Effect:**

Three of TVC's federal grants under CFDA #93.104 were overcharged approximately \$34,000. In addition, eight other of TVC's federal grants under four CFDA programs were overcharged approximately \$20,000.

#### Recommendation:

We recommend that management reimburse granting agencies for amounts overcharged by reducing subsequent invoices or submitting payment to the agencies for the amount of the unallowable costs.

#### Management's Response:

Management agrees with the audit finding and will reimburse the granting agencies that need to be reimbursed by check or by adjusting invoices where appropriate for the amounts overcharged.
