INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Board of Directors of Studio Tenn Theatre Company:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Studio Tenn Theatre Company (the "Organization") which are comprised of the statement of financial position as of July 31, 2013, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting polices used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

Notes to the Financial Statements

July 31, 2013

(1) Nature of activities

Studio Tenn Theatre Company (the "Organization"), was incorporated in 2009 to use a rich combination of talent from Nashville and Broadway to bring classic works of drama and musical theatre to life in Middle Tennessee; and, to provide innovative educational programs designed to entertain, educate and inspire the rising artists of our unique community.

(2) Summary of significant accounting policies

The financial statements of the Organization are presented on the accrual basis. The significant accounting policies followed are described below.

(a) Basis of presentation

Net assets and revenues, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Organization and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

<u>Unrestricted net assets</u> - Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions.

<u>Temporarily restricted net assets</u> - Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that may or will be met either by actions of the Organization and/or the passage of time.

<u>Permanently restricted net assets</u> - Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that they be maintained permanently by the Organization.

All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Amounts received that are designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes are reported as temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support that increases those net asset classes.

There were no temporarily or permanently restricted net assets based on donor-imposed restrictions as of July 31, 2013.

(b) Cash equivalents

The Organization considers all highly liquid investments with original maturities of less than three months to be cash equivalents.

(c) Accounts receivable

The Organization reports accounts receivable, net of an allowance for doubtful accounts, at the amount which represents management's estimate of the amount that ultimately will be realized. The Organization reviews the adequacy of its allowance for uncollectible accounts on an ongoing basis, using historical payment trends, as well as review of specific accounts, and makes adjustments in the allowance as necessary. At July 31, 2013, the allowance for doubtful accounts was zero.

(d) Income taxes

The Organization is exempt from federal income taxes under the provisions of Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), and, accordingly, no provision for income taxes is included in the financial statements. The Organization believes it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken, and as such, does not have any uncertain tax positions which are material to the financial statements.

As of July 31, 2013, the Organization has accrued no interest and no penalties related to uncertain tax positions. It is the Organization's policy to recognize interest and/or penalties related to income tax matters in income tax expense.

The Organization files a U.S. Federal information tax return. The Organization is currently open to audit under the statute of limitations by the Internal Revenue Service for years subsequent to July 31, 2010.

(e) Revenue recognition

Individual ticket revenue is recorded after each performance. Contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted net assets depending on the existence or nature of any donor restrictions.

(f) Contributed services

No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for donated services. The Organization generally pays for services requiring specific expertise. However, many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist the Organization at the residents' facilities, but these services do not meet the criteria for recognition as contributed services.

(g) <u>Use of estimates</u>

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions which affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

(h) Events occurring after reporting date

The Organization has evaluated events and transactions that occurred between July 31, 2013 and January 9, 2014, which is the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, for possible recognition or disclosure in the financial statements. No such events or transactions were noted requiring recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

(3) Lease commitments

The Organization has entered into a lease agreement for office space with a monthly payment of \$1,500 and an expiration date of September 2014. Rent expense for 2013 totaled \$9,470.
