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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

The Board of Directors of Prevent Child Abuse Tennessee:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Prevent Child Abuse Tennessee (the "Organization") which are comprised of the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2014, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Prevent Child Abuse Tennessee as of June 30, 2014, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards, as required by Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated January 5, 2015, on our consideration of the Organization's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering the Organization's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Notes to the Financial Statements

June 30, 2014

(1) Nature of activities

Prevent Child Abuse Tennessee (the "Organization"), is a private, not-for-profit organization located in Nashville, Tennessee. The Organization provides services aimed at preventing the occurrence or continuation of child abuse. These services consist of parent support groups, a statewide toll-free parent helpline, and pairing of trained volunteers with new families at a high risk for child abuse. All services are available at no charge. Principal funding is provided by federal grants through the Tennessee Department of Human Services. Organization operations are conducted by the executive director and staff under the guidance of the board of directors.

(2) Summary of significant accounting policies

The financial statements of the Organization are presented on the accrual basis. The significant accounting policies followed are described below.

(a) Basis of presentation

Net assets and revenues, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Organization and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

<u>Unrestricted net assets</u> - Net assets which are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions.

<u>Temporarily restricted net assets</u> - Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that may or will be met either by actions of the Organization and/or the passage of time.

<u>Permanently restricted net assets</u> - Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that they be maintained permanently by the Organization.

All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Amounts received that are designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes are reported as temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support that increases those net asset classes. There were no temporarily restricted or permanently restricted net assets as of June 30, 2014.

Expirations of temporary restrictions on net assets are reported as net assets released from restriction between the applicable classes of net assets. Restricted donations which have been used in the same period as received are considered unrestricted in nature and reported as such.

(b) Receivables and credit policies

Substantially all receivables are from grantors. The carrying amount of receivables is reduced by a valuation allowance, if necessary, which reflects management's best estimate of the amounts that will not be collected. The allowance is estimated based on management's knowledge of its grantors and customers, historical loss experience and existing economic conditions. Late or interest charges on delinquent accounts are not recorded until collected. Accounts receivable are written-off when, in management's opinion, all collection efforts have been exhausted. As of June 30, 2014, no valuation allowance was deemed necessary.

(c) Property and equipment

Property and equipment is stated at cost, net of depreciation. Depreciation is provided over the assets' estimated useful lives using the straight-line method. Equipment is generally depreciated over a period between five and seven years. The Organization's policy is to capitalize property and equipment expenditures over \$1,000 with useful lives of one year or more.

Expenditures for maintenance and repairs are expensed when incurred. Expenditures for renewals or betterments are capitalized. When property is retired or sold, the cost and the related accumulated depreciation are removed from the accounts, and the resulting gain or loss is included in the change in unrestricted net assets.

(d) Income taxes

The Organization is exempt from federal income taxes under the provisions of Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), and, accordingly, no provision for income taxes is included in the financial statements. The Organization does not believe there are any uncertain tax positions and, accordingly it has not recognized any asset or liability for unrecognized tax benefit.

As of June 30, 2014, the Organization has accrued no interest and no penalties related to uncertain tax positions. It is the Organization's policy to recognize interest and/or penalties related to income tax matters in income tax expense.

The Organization files a U.S. Federal information tax return. The Organization is currently open to audit under the statute of limitations by the Internal Revenue Service for years subsequent to June 30, 2010.

(e) Revenue recognition

Contribution revenue is recognized when received. Contributions and grants restricted by the donor, grantor, or other outside parties for particular operating purposes are deemed to be earned and reported as revenues when the Organization has incurred expenditures in compliance with the specific grant restrictions. Revenue from special events is recognized when it is earned, generally when the event occurs.

(f) In-kind donations

Individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist the Organization with program services. Certain contributed services, such as those provided by volunteers trained in social work, require specialized skills and would otherwise need to be purchased if not provided by donation. Accordingly, the Organization recognized revenue and expense for those contributed services in the amount of \$57,409 during the year ended June 30, 2014.

(g) Long-lived assets

Management evaluates the recoverability of the investment in long-lived assets on an ongoing basis and recognizes any impairment in the year of determination. It is reasonably possible that relevant conditions could change in the near term and necessitate a change in management's estimate of the recoverability of these assets.

(h) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

(i) Functional allocation of expenses

Directly identifiable expenses are charged to programs and supporting services. Expenses related to more than one function are charged to programs and supporting services on the basis of periodic time and expense studies. General and administrative expenses include those expenses that are not directly identifiable with any other specific function but provide for the overall support and direction of the Organization.

(j) Events occurring after reporting date

The Organization has evaluated events and transactions that occurred between June 30, 2014 and January 5, 2015 which is the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, for possible recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

(3) Credit risk and other concentration

Grants from the State and Federal Governments amounted to approximately 88% and 96% of the Organization's revenue and accounts receivable, respectively, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2014.

(4) Line of credit

The Organization has a \$250,000 line of credit with a bank, which is secured by all grants receivable and bears interest at a variable rate equal to the bank's index rate plus 1.5% (5.25% at June 30, 2014). The line of credit is set to mature on April 30, 2015. The Organization owed approximately \$201,000 on this line of credit at June 30, 2014.

(5) Lease commitments

The Company leases office space under operating leases. Rent expense under these leases amounted to \$60,875 in 2014. Future minimum payments under these leases total approximately \$47,000 for the year ending June 30, 2015.

(6) Supplemental disclosures of cash flow statement information

Interest paid during the year ended June 30, 2014 totaled \$12,762.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Organization's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control.

The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Organization's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

The recommendation has been implemented. The Organization has hired a full time certified professional accountant to share financial functions and assigned key accounting functions in a manner sufficient to ensure proper segregation of duties.

The Organization did not have proper policies and detailed purposes for debit card purchases during the year ended June 30, 2013.

Recommendation

Current Status

This finding does not warrant further action. During the year ended June 30, 2014, the Organization replaced its debit cards with credit cards, and, in conjunction with this change, established control over credit card use, including retention of receipts or other supporting documentation.
